Nevertheless, patients expect to get superb service from a skilled and experienced anaesthetist in a wide range of regional anaesthesia techniques with profound knowledge in applied anatomy, pharmacology, toxicology, monitoring, and expect no less than a perfect, pain-free technique without complications and a quick recovery.

Nowadays, RA has become a science, which needs to be mastered by systematic teaching and permanent practice by many anaesthetists and not remain an act in the hands of few. AORA took up the role to support the above values in action, ten years ago. It is now an established society, with annual meetings, and an international journal on regional anaesthesia (IJORA). I was privileged to attend several of the annual AORA meetings, which were always perfectly organised, offering a wide range of scientific topics, combined with hands-on workshops, including the popular ultrasonography (US).






That conversation over a leisurely lunch is the start of a 10-year journey called AORA.


"What AORA offers in training should be practical, as well as deep into the theory and research. It had to be everything inclusive and only a dedicated body could do that, that too at an APEX level." These words by Dr Vrushali Ponde set the context for the genesis of this 10-year old organisation. In her own words, it had to be an organisation that had people who, "would be many but work as one." And because of the fervent desire that it be apolitical and non-partisan, it was called an academy, and not an association.

The distance between when AORA was registered to the first national conference, was a mere three months. And of course, there were challenges. Raising funds, for example. Dr Vrushali points out that partners like Sonosite and Neon were ever-helpful, and stood by them. As did the industry, whose support was and is invaluable. 500 delegates showed up to the first-ever AORA National Conference. The magnificent Tata Institute played host, filled to the brim with eager and expectant attendees.

For Dr Vrushali, the large numbers make two things clear. It spoke of the need for regional anaesthesia, and it spoke volumes of the credibility of the teachers who were handling the sessions. The second factor was yet another indication that they were on the right track with their academy.

She speaks highly of her colleague, Dr Satish Kulkarni. His being a senior professional colleague has never been a factor in their interactions. Dr Vrushali recalls a particular incident where Dr Kulkarni travelled all the way to a nursing home where she was, to show her the stoles that were to be gifts for the women participants of the 2011 conference. Such is his commitment to the cause and his nature. It is no surprise that when it came to selecting someone with a transparent and structured approach to be the Treasurer for AORA, the team looked no further than him.

In 2012, as an extension of the promotional activities for regional anaesthesia the organising team of AORA2012 began a postdoc fellowship at Ganga Hospital, the first of its kind, in India.



The police at a banquet for regional anaesthesiologists? It sounds unreal, and yet it did happen in 2013, when the police showed up (well before curfew time) to enquire at the gala banquet and orchestra that was part of the national conference in Pune. We've always said it-medical events are fun too!

Another fun element that was also extremely practical was the coloured caps. Delegates who registered for workshops were given colour-coded caps for each. This helped the organisers keep track of participation. A glance at the heads was enough to know if the delegate was in the right workshop. The cap, printed with the AORA label, was a souvenir too. It cost only 30 rupees, much to Dr Sandeep Mutha's delight.

Economy was very much on his mind, back then. And rightly so. The organiser of the National Conference in Pune in 2013 had ambitious plans. A cadaveric workshop that needed 28 cadavers was no small task. He procured two from Mumbai, a difficult and expensive task. For the rest, he turned to Pune's Smt. Kashibai Navale Medical College and General Hospital. There was also the question of registrations. Dr Mutha was expecting around 500 registrations, a little above the previous year. To his surprise, there were 800 registrations, a massive jump. "But we were prepared for everything," he says of his team. For months before the event, the team had weekly meetings at Dr Mutha's house, to go through every nuance of the event. There were 8 workshops and the event needed 28 ultrasound machines.

An unusual aspect of the conference was that there were no coffee breaks or even a lunch break. A round-the-clock coffee counter was put in place for anaesthesiologists to grab a cup whenever they wanted. Lunch was served in the mess hall, with many TVs set up to ensure that the delegates did not miss a moment of the programme that continued parallelly. This, Dr Mutha believes, is a time-saving practice. He recalls with amusement an incident at the faculty dinner where butter chicken was served. The sweet-spicy flavour greatly appealed to the foreign faculty members, who asked that it be served at each dinner! A taste of India, in more ways than one-this was AORA's National Conference in 2013.




















































PUNCH

Dr Ritesh Roy, whose brainchild the workshop is, organised the first PUNCH workshop, back in 2017. This was a first for Orissa state, too, and went a long way in the dissemination of information about regional anesthesia.

All his fears were put to rest when senior committee members expressed their complete support for the programme and willingness to be faculty members at the event. In a day or two of the announcement, PUNCH 2017 was fully booked. Dr Roy fondly remembers the warm encouragement in the form of the feedback he received from AORA faculty-that PUNCH 2017 could challenge any international workshop.

In 2018 and 2019, Dr Roy approached the IFA for sponsorship; the repute of PUNCH in the preceding years made the process easier, and the workshop took place with the support of AORA. The then-President of IFA was part of the workshop in 2018, a point of pride for Dr Roy.

TRACK2019

TATA REGIONAL ANAESTHESIA COURSE, KOLKATA 2019

The first ever AORA event in East India, the first for Kolkata, TRACK2019 (Tata Regional Anaesthesia Course, Kolkata), in January, 2019 is special in so many ways to Dr Arunangshu Chakraborty. He believes that the seed of regional anaesthesia in this part of the country was planted here, with this event.

As with all AORA events, senior members travelled long distances to be part of the event. Dr Giri who did an epic 28-hour journey, changing buses and flights from Shivsagar, Dr Himjyoti from Shillong, Dr Javed Khan who travelled from Indore, Dr Ritesh and Dr Gopal who ensured that they were part of the event.

This kind of commitment, to further the cause of regional anaesthesia in the country became a source of deep inspiration for practitioners in the city. It is of special significance to note that apart from stay and local transport, none of the senior AORA faculty were reimbursed for travel, and travelled on their own dime.

Dr Arunangshu Chakraborty succeeded in doing what he had set out to with the event- to act as a bridge between the central body of AORA and senior anaesthesiology professors in the eight medical colleges in the city. To this end, he ensured that for every single session, a faculty member of AORA was blended with local senior faculty.

The workshop was conducted in the auditorium of the satellite centre of Tata Medical Centre,

Premashrya. There was a strict cap of no more than 20 students per institution, and 2 months before the event was held, the registrations were at 200, a massive departure from the 30-40 per workshop that was the norm for other events.

The event was held on a Sunday, allowing the attendees-post-graduate students- to make full use of the expertise. Delegates from not only the 8 medical schools, but as far as Jharkhand, Manipur, Assam, Orissa, Bokaro, Jamshedpur attended the event. The live volunteer scanning, where delegates had an opportunity to hold the probe and understand the anatomy in volunteers, was a huge hit as well.

The very fact that the Face book page set up for the 2019 event still receives queries about when the next one will be held, speaks volumes of the standard of the event. There is a difference between seeing and doing, as Dr Chakraborty points out.

"Unlike many other platforms where scientific content often takes a backseat to socialising, at AORA, academics comes in the forefront always. This is how we hold the flag of AORA high." says Dr Arunangshu Chakraborty.









DUE EAST

There are many memorable firsts in the events conducted by Dr Surajit Giri. Every single workshop has helped popularise the use of regional anesthesia in the north east. Like with most places, it takes a while for even cutting-edge medical breakthroughs to reach far and wide. For Dr Giri, the 2015 workshop was a breakthrough point.

He believed it was vital for an event of this nature, because there was a necessity to popularise the methods, because they led to better pain management. He was concerned about whether he would find patients for the live workshops, but his fears were unfounded. The event put regional anaesthesia on the map.

By his own reckoning, while earlier perhaps 2% of doctors knew about regional anaesthesia, now the number is anywhere between 60-70%. While nerve blocks and other gadgets were not available in 2015, today about 10 % of doctors, use ultrasound machines, and nerve stimulation machines- pns- are used by 90 % of doctors. Another first was the e-talk model used in the AORA PNS/USG guided hands even in 2018 at Izal, Mizoram. For difficult to access places, an etalk model makes more sense, and that's the model that Dr Giri experimented with. The etalk, delivered from Mumbai by Dr Vrushali Ponde, was a huge success, watched by doctors in remote parts of the country.

For Dr Giri, it is the support of the AORA committee which is a game changer. He says, "when the committee supports, there is more credibility to practise the procedures spoken about."















A CADAVER WORKSHOP WITH A DIFFERENCE

Dr Sivashanmugam & Dr Archana Areti

The last AORA event before COVID struck is definitely one for the books. To start with, unlike most one-day workshops that cover all body parts, this workshop focussed only on brachial plexus blocks. The aim was simple- to not rush delegates, to teach not only anatomy in minute detail (the arm was divided into 5 sections) but also to know how to troubleshoot when complications arise. The second aim was basic science correlation. When one reaches a specialisation, one may miss basic anatomy. However, this and its variations are essential for regional anaesthesiologists. A good way to reduce failure rates is to not only see how a procedure is done but to do it, to get better at clinical skills. In a bid to avoid information overload, Dr Archana says, instead of a tsunami, there was a tidal wave of information."

The demographic that attended the workshop was surprising too. While you are most likely to see postgraduate or novice residents, a few experienced consultants showed up as well. Of special note is Dr Palaniappan from ortho1, who was a delegate and shared his valuable inputs. His feedback was especially encouraging. Despite his initial scepticism at an entire day's event devoted to brachial plexus (he had planned to leave post the morning session), doctor Palaniappan stayed for the entire duration of the workshop (8 a.m to 5 p.m), amazed at how exhaustive the session was. Of special note is how well the team worked well together, communicating and coordinating every step of the way. Government Medical College, Coimbatore was the home team for this event. Dissection videos were followed carefully, going a long way in creating an event that catered to everyone-from the novice to the experienced.

If there was a theme to the event, it was certainly, "Sharing is caring." The materials and contact details were all shared with the delegates. Even the recipe used to create the phantom- a simple mixture of corn flour and water- was shared with the delegates. This is important because the traditional phantoms used are expensive, and the others, made of paneer or tofu, cause food wastage. Dr Archana believes that with the establishing of separate committees at AORA, makes it easier to do more workshops that focus on one limb at a time. She believes that in order to revolutionise regional anesthesia in the country, it is more important to use the Indian demographic model, to get a better understanding of what needs to be done.

"The culmination of experiences across the nation- all of us contribute to it," she says.

REGIONAL ANAESTHESIA WORKSHOP & CADAVERIC AND ULTRASOUND WORKSHOP AND CME

It was 2013, early days yet for AORA, when Dr Hetalkumar Vadera organised the workshop- the first of its kind in Saurashtra. He believes that the need for regional anaesthesia comes from the high-risk cases he sees, especially in corporate hospitals. In addition, it is not enough to know, it is essential to teach it as well.

The 2019 workshop was fully booked in 24 hours. Dr Sandeep Diwan and his team came a day prior to perform dissections in the cadaveric lab, allowing them to show the techniques directly to delegates. The workshop went on from 8 a.m. to 9.30 pm, and was met with rapt attention and learning.

For Dr Vadera, "teaching all members is a motto," an act that gives him a sense of achievement and satisfaction.















Academic Activities & Fellowships

In 2012, as an extension of the promotional activities for regional anaesthesia, AORA began a postdoc fellowship, the first of its kind, in India. In 2014, AORA opened up the fellowship to the world. It now boasts of candidates from Asia-Pacific and Africa, all ambassadors for the excellence of training in regional anaesthesia in this part of the world.

AORA Sonosite Fellowship

The AORA-Sonosite fellowship was initiated in 2018, as a project to inspire promising anesthesiologists. The week-long mentorship program starts with a written exam. Six successful candidates are selected to spend a week at top regional anesthesia hospitals across the country, being guided by experienced faculty. The AORA-Sonosite partnership takes care of all the expenses of these candidates.

Fellowship of AORA

Aims and Objectives

On successful completion of the course, the fellow should be able to demonstrate competency in terms of skill, knowledge and attitude in delivering safe and effective regional anesthesia for better patient care.

Eligibility criteria for admission

MCI recognized MD / DA / DNB degree in Anesthesiology / any equivalent Anaesthesiology degree from their home country (for NRI candidates).

Selection process

Candidates need to apply directly to the recognized institute of their choice. Selection will be done by the AORA recognized teacher of the respective institute based on candidate's eligibility which should be confirmed by the individual teachers & institutes.

The selection process may vary from institute to institute: it is at the sole discretion of teacher and institution. AORA is not involved in the selection process directly or indirectly.

Candidates will be paid a salary/stipend as per the rules of the institute where they are appointed.

EDRA Exams

European Diploma in Regional Anaesthesia & Acute Pain Management (EDRA)



The European Diploma in Regional Anaesthesia & Acute Pain Management was created in 2005 with the goal of establishing high standards for regional anaesthesia in Europe.

The Diploma intends to widen the activity spectrum of those anaesthesia specialists who are already in clinical practice and are interested in acquiring additional knowledge encompassing the entire field of regional anaesthesia and acute pain management.

The concept of ESRA- and CME / CDP-approved courses and workshops takes into account the knowledge level of reasonably experienced clinicians. The salient points of different techniques, the overall strategies for their use, as well as their advantages and risks, are stressed in each of the courses and workshops candidates attend. Regional techniques are integral components of anaesthesia and are frequently administered to high-risk patients, ranging from newborns to the frail elderly. Therefore, the objective of the examination is to treat defined subjects in an encompassing way, with sound knowledge of anatomy, physiology, and pharmacology related to regional anaesthesia, as well as skills in block performance in a holistic context. A proper approach to acute pain management is mandatory in the clinical practice of anaesthesia and its knowledge is part of the content of the EDRA examination.


Since 2016, Indian candidates are able to attend the EDRA examination at the AORA annual conference.

Over the years the design has changed, but what has remained constant is the immensely rich educational content.









What can AORA4U do for you?

The smartphone in our pocket is a tool with many roles to play in our lives. It has replaced the humble PC for many of our day-to-day needs. The regional anaesthesia (RA) expert needed an app to record the logs, follow-up patients, enhance the knowledge and aid in audit/research activities. AORA embarked on a mission to develop an app for the above purposes in 2017.

AORA4U is primarily a resource/logbook app developed specifically for RA. In India, a significant proportion of the surgical cases are done in small nursing homes by freelance anaesthetists. They do many cases under RA. This app can help freelance anaesthetists and anaesthetists working in private institutes to maintain their log book and publish data. Ready reference videos on in the app can aid continuous refinement of knowledge.

The app was developed in six months and was launched officially during the annual scientific meeting of AORA in Indore in September 2017. The app is available for all AORA members to use without any added expense. It is available on both the Android and iOS platforms.



It has the following features:

1. Logbook:

This is designed keeping in mind the various parameters needed to be captured for RA procedures. It has a user-friendly interface (Fig 1, 2, 3) to capture all details. The closure of a procedure is done after noting the occurrence of any complications or catheter related issues (Fig 4).

A useful cloning function is provided to minimise data entry and hence save time for commonly performed operations/procedures (Fig 5). The data of the logbook will be stored locally on your phone and backed up on a secure server. There is no patient identifiable data that is captured in the process.

2. Review of cases:

A query function is provided to review all the logs (Fig 6). A monthly report mailed to the registered email will be sent starting from September 2020 (following the next update).

3. Knowledge portal:

The latest journal articles from leading anaesthesia journals can be accessed from a single point. Videos of the latest AORA webinars, talks from AORA scientific meetings and block procedures can be accessed from this portal

At present, there are 525 active users and they have been accessing the resources regularly. Continuous refinement of the app is needed going forward to ensure that it serves all members in the best way. This is possible with more members using it and giving their constant feedback (aora4uindia@gmail.com).


